What is Liverpool Philharmonic?

Liverpool Philharmonic enhances and transforms lives through music.

At the heart of our work is the critically-acclaimed Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra (the UK's oldest) and Choir; an extensive programme of participatory work with young people and others across our community; and presentation of almost 400 concerts and events each year at our home, Liverpool Philharmonic Hall.

- Over 350,000 people attend Liverpool Philharmonic concerts each year.
- 73,000 young people participate in our Youth Company and associated ensembles, attend concerts or take part in our In Harmony programme.
- Over 700,000 people in more than 170 countries listen to Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra recordings each month on Spotify, more than any UK orchestra outside London.
- We deliver 13 concerts for schools each year, attended by 18,000 children from 300 schools from Liverpool, across the region and beyond, as far afield as Wales and Yorkshire.
- Over 17,00 people have benefitted from our Music and Health Programme over the last 15 years.

Liverpool Philharmonic is rooted in our city

We are central to Liverpool's cultural offering, being the largest music organisation and one of the largest cultural organisations in the city, employing over 240 people. As well as our work in Liverpool, our Orchestra represent the city with performances and broadcasts across the UK and around the world.

The city's young people are a central focus of our work. Our In Harmony programme provides an intensive, daily music-making programme for over 1500 children in Everton and Anfield, North Liverpool, and we run more than 5,000 workshops and events in community settings for all ages across the city. The Liverpool Philharmonic Youth Company provides a range of opportunities for music making for young people, including the Liverpool Philharmonic Youth Orchestra, Liverpool Philharmonic Youth Choir, Children's Choirs, and Rushworth Young Composers programme.

Our Music and Health Programme works in partnership with NHS Trusts, including Mersey Care NHS Foundation Trust, Clatterbridge Cancer Centre NHS Foundation Trust, The Walton Centre NHS Foundation Trust and Improving Me; using music to benefit health and wellbeing. The Music and Health programme has been running continuously since 2008 and has worked to benefit over 17,000 individuals across the Liverpool City Region.

Liverpool Philharmonic is committed to diversity and inclusion

We work hard to reach right across our community through our learning work, and concert programme.

We attract world class artists to perform at Liverpool Philharmonic Hall and our small venue, Music Room, with a diverse programme of performances ranging from classical, contemporary, rock, pop, folk, roots, and jazz to comedy, film and spoken word. We work with many organisations and cultural partners in the city to ensure that the artists and performances we put on stage, and the audiences we attract, truly represent our community.

And we are working hard to ensure that our workforce is as diverse as possible.

Ensemble 10:10

Ensemble 10:10 was founded in 1997 by members of the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra. It soon became integrated into the regular concert giving of Liverpool Philharmonic, able to draw on the talents of the whole orchestra as required. It is central to Liverpool Philharmonic's commitment to new writing and, in particular, supporting composers from Liverpool and the North-West region.

As part of Liverpool Philharmonic's ground-breaking collaboration with the University of Liverpool, in April 2022, Ensemble 10:10 started a new era as it became resident at the Tung Auditorium within the University's Yoko Ono Centre.

What is the Rushworth Composition Prize?

A funded year-long opportunity for an early-career composer to build a collaborative and creative relationship with Liverpool Philharmonic and Ensemble 10:10.

In the 2023-24 Season, Liverpool Philharmonic will welcome an early career composer as the winner of the Rushworth Composition Prize.

The Rushworth Composition Prize, in association with the Rushworth Foundation, provides an exceptional range of opportunities for an early-career composer aged 18+ with no upper age limit.

The prize winner will have access to a range of bespoke practical workshops, mentoring, networking and career support during the duration of the Prize, and beyond. A prize of £1,000 is awarded to the winner and the prize culminates in writing a new work for Ensemble 10:10, which is performed as part of the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra season 2024/25. Travel expenses are paid for the duration of the prize.

We connect music creators working across_North West England and Nationwide through the alumni of the prize. To find out more about previous winners please follow this link. Previous winners have worked with us after their year has ended, and benefited from continued support, guidance, and commission opportunities.

The winner will:

- Be partnered with a mentor either of their choice or one suggested by Liverpool Philharmonic
- Meet regularly with their mentor throughout the year for sessions to support the commission and career development.
- Receive bespoke instrument workshops with Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra Musicians
- Observe rehearsal visits with Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra
- Have access to free tickets to Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra performances.
- Be supported by Liverpool Philharmonic staff in the commissioning process, through regular check-ins, meetings, and a tailored package of support for the winner.
- The winner will have a readthrough of their piece with Ensemble 10:10 in a workshop ahead of submitting the final commission. This will also be an opportunity to meet with the conductor before the premiere.
- The composer will also receive one year's complimentary membership of <u>Ivors Academy</u> the UK's leading professional association for music creators. As part of the membership to the Ivors Academy the winner will be part of a National Network of Music Creators, Legal Referral and Tax Advice, reduced administration fee on Copydan Income and discounted tickets to Ivors events.

Eligibility Criteria – what are we looking for?

Applicants should demonstrate that they are:

- Be at least 18 years old on 1st October 2023, there is no upper age limit for applicants
- Currently live, work, or have been born in the North West of England (Merseyside, Cheshire, Greater Manchester, Lancashire, Cumbria), or be a registered student at a Northwest-based Higher Education institution. be at an early stage of their career as a composer
- Be at an early stage of their career. There are no minimum qualification requirements for applicants.
- Have an understanding of writing for contemporary classical ensembles and orchestral instruments.

What is the time commitment?

The Rushworth Composition Prize is a 12-month commitment. The winner of the prize should adhere to the deadlines set by Liverpool Philharmonic. They must also ensure they are available for the Ensemble 10:10 workshop and premiere dates.

How to apply

Please provide the following materials on the application form

- 1. A supporting statement, outlining why you have applied, what you would hope to gain from this prize and from developing a relationship with Liverpool Philharmonic, and how you would describe your personal composition style and approach. The supporting statement can also be provided in an alternative format including video.
- 2. A CV, including a list of works.
- 3. Audio recordings and scores of two examples of original works for orchestral instruments, alongside a short explanation of why you have chosen to submit these works.
 - 1. Scores must be submitted electronically in PDF format only.
 - 2. Audio recordings should be submitted as a digital file or link to an online version e.g. Soundcloud or similar. Digital recordings of works which have not had a live performance are acceptable.

As part of the Application we would kindly ask that you complete an Equal Opportunities and Monitoring form. Liverpool Philharmonic is committed to ensuring that everyone can access our Learning programmes and that we better understanding the communities that we work with. All information collected will be anonymised and may be shared with funders and project partners, meeting the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)
